# Policy on Animals in Food Establishments

# **Smiths**

## GENERAL OVERVIEW

- The only dogs permitted to be inside a grocery store are trained service dogs.
- Service dogs are "trained to do work or perform tasks for the benefit of an individual with a disability"
- Service dogs must be under the control of their handlers and not in the grocery cart where customers place their food.
- Comfort Animals are not Service Animals.



#### Is your dog a Service Animal?

- The only animals permitted to be inside stores that sell food are trained service dogs or trained service miniature horses.
- Other types of animals are not allowed.
- Is your dog required because of a disability?
- What work or task has your animal been trained to perform?

#### Service Animal or Comfort/Emotional Support Animal

- Service animals are "trained to do work or perform tasks for the benefit of an individual with a disability".
- "Provision of emotional support, well-being, comfort, or companionship" does not meet the ADA definition of a trained service animal and these animals are not allowed to be inside food establishments.
- Service animals must be under the control of their handlers, and should not be inside of a shopping cart where other customers place their food items.

## **Federal Law**

ADA 5 U.S.C. 301; 28 U.S.C. 509, 510; 42 U.S.C. 12186(b). Part 36 – Nondiscrimination on the basis of disability in public accommodations and commercial facilities.
